
STAYING HEALTHY

One of the featured items in our exhibit is Dr. Woolsey's leather doctor's bag, part of a recent donation to the Archives. While Dr. Woolsey practised in New York, he spent the end of his life in Mountsberg, where the Woolsey family had been for over a century.

"In the use of various vaccines and in the case of antiseptics in surgery. [...] We feel quite confident of recovery with a supply of vaccine on hand."

SUNNYBROOK DAIRY

Flamborough's agricultural heritage is rich with different types of farming and production. This exhibit features some articles from Waterdown's Sunnybrook Dairy.

Sunnybrook Dairy once operated out of their location on Main Street South. Formerly the first Waterdown Fire Hall, the building still stands just south of the Copper Kettle Cafe. Crates of glass bottles of white and chocolate milk were delivered daily to school just in time for lunch. The milk man would not only deliver just milk - Sunnybrook would also deliver blocks of ice for ice boxes prior to home refrigeration and freezers.
