CELEBRATING OUR PEOPLE

Presidents of the Society over our last 50 years



Peter Vance President 1973—1976

Our first President, Peter Vance was a Society member up until the time of his passing in 2017. A scotch drinking, bagpipe playing photographer, author, artist and lawyer he was fiercely proud of his local roots. He was part of the Waterdown Centennial Committee which published the Centennial book in 1967, and his son Jonathan has donated thousands of Peter's photos, negatives and film to the Archives.



Eilene Kennedy President 1976—1978

Passionate about local history, Eilene was a reporter for the Flamborough Review and a member of LACAC, the volunteer organization which documented hundreds of Heritage Properties in Flamborough. She was actively involved in many historical and heritage endeavours throughout Flamborough and was named Citizen of the Year in 1987.



Paul Maycock President 1978—1981

Paul was one of the inaugural members in 1973, a member of the Building Inventory Committee and a Director for several years. A Professor of Biology at University of Toronto, he planted a garden of native plants around his house on Dundas Street.




Rick Clark President 1981—1983

Another avid photographer, Rick helped copy many photos for the Society and printed many of the photos used in the "Photographic History of Waterdown and Environs 1866—1984' display at Grace Anglican Church.

Robert Wray President 1983—1986 and 1990

Bob became a Director in 1980 and was actively involved in the annual Strawberry Socials, and photographic work for the Society and Archives. He remained active on and off the Board until 2008 and was honoured by Flamborough Town Council in 1993 for his dedication to the Society and promotion of the Society to the community at large. Bob also dedicated years to researching W.W. I veterans for the Archives files.



Letitia Fraser President 1986—1990

Along with her first husband Arthur Wallace, Letitia was an inaugural member of the Heritage Society. She continued to volunteer her time to the Society for many years but was only on the Board of Directors for her term as president.



Lorraine Carey President 1991—1993

Lorraine became a Director in 1989, then was Vice-President and President.



Palmer Neal President 1993—2000

Palmer became a Director in 1991 and was active on the Board in various capacities until 2009.





Fred Perry President 2000—2002

Fred became a Director in 1997, then Vice-President and President.



Lena Aggus President 2002—2004

Lena became a Director in 2000, then was Vice-President and President. Although her time with the Society was short, she continues to volunteer in the community, is an active member of the Rotary Club and the food bank at Food with Grace.



Dana Purvis President 2004—2005

Dana became a Director in 1996 and served as Secretary for many years before becoming President. She remained on the Board until she moved to Eastern Ontario in 2009.



Bob Lalonde President 2005—2009

Bob became a Director in 1985, and served on the Board for 25 years. He continues to volunteer at the Flamborough Archives and along with Bob Wray has researched and compiled comprehensive files on W.W.I veterans from Flamborough. He was very involved with Scouting for many years and continues to volunteer at Knox Presbyterian Church .



Cindy Allen President 2009—2010

Cindy began on the Board as the Secretary in 2007, then became Vice-President and President. She remained a Director until 2014. Like so many of our past Board members, Cindy remains active in the Community with the Rotary Club and as Office Manager for Grace Anglican Church.

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Nathan Tidridge President 2010—2012

Nathan began volunteering with the Society in 2005, became a Director in 2007, Vice-President then President. He is a teacher at Waterdown District High School and is well known for his efforts to promote Indigenous history, and the monarchy. He has published several books with the latest being The Extraordinary History of Waterdown and East Flamborough.



Chris Rivait President 2012 to present

Chris joined the Board in 2010 as a Vice-President and has remained as our President ever since. His term has been challenging, with fewer volunteers and several years of COVID. A father of four, he is active in the community with various soccer, baseball and hockey associations.



Sylvia Wray Archivist, 1984—2015

Originally a teacher, Sylvia joined the Board as Secretary in 1984 and was the Newsletter Editor for many years. However she is best known as the volunteer Archivist for over 30 years—and for her calligraphy! Sylvia also spent many years on the Hamilton Municipal Heritage Committee and is co-author of several books. She has been honoured with several awards over the years.

The Waterdown-East Flamborough Heritage Society - the beginning

The

At the next meeting in February 1973, the special guest was T. Melville Bailey of the Head-ofthe-Lake Historical Society who gave them draft outline of the steps to be taken and stressing that it should not focus only on Don Woods genealogy. suggested that a nominating committee be responsible for preparing a slate of officers to present at the first general meeting.

By the end of the third meeting in February 1973, the Steering Committee had suggested a name, formed Nominating, Publicity, **Programme** and Property Committees, created a budget, appointed a temporary and suggested treasurer, temporary constitution. The name was to include 'Heritage' rather than 'Historical' as it was felt that 'Heritage' was a better description of what was to be preserved.

The Archives, rather than the Society, has taken on the predominant role.

> The early constitution had Board members staying for two years, later three years. Because of this, our listing of Presidents shows most of them staying for short terms.

> The constitution also reflected the number of volunteers - at one point there were to be no more than 22 Directors!

> Today, we are scrambling to come up with enough people to fill the various Board positions, let alone have directors.

> We wish to acknowledge those people who steered the Society over the years as listed in our Heritage Paper on pages 2-5.

> We hope that people will continue to support the Heritage Society, and to volunteer.
